PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Fall Greetings! Although we are currently still enjoying excellent weather, we know that soon the "Dog Days of Summer" will be a distant memory and first we will be raking leaves and (shudder) then shoveling snow!

However, one of the best memories of the Summer of 2013 will be – again – Children at Risk's summer day camp – **Camp Kaleidoscope**, or Camp K as one parent fondly referred to it! Year 3 of this awesome, specialized camp wrapped up its 5 weeks on Friday, August 9th. In reference of post-secondary school terms, this would be called the Junior Year of Camp K. Well, folks, "Junior" really grew up BIG time this year!!

Camp K averaged 46 Campers per week and increased Camp spots by almost 58% from 2012 (over 158% from 2011). With the funding and sponsorships from our Donors (The King's Daughters And Sons Ottawa City Union, HOPE Volleyball SummerFest, the Ottawa Celebrity Sports Dinner, the Ottawa Catholic School Board Focus on Youth Program, the Toskan Casale Youth And Philanthropy Initiative and the Ottawa Airport Authority Project Clear Skies Initiative), Children at Risk was still able to subsidize the cost of Camp spots by almost 2/3, while still employing over 50+ Staff to service ASD Campers ages 4-22.

I understand plans are in the works for our Saturday Fun Club respite days, as we try to continue the support for our families throughout the Year. Maybe some Christmas and March Break Camps, as well!

Many thanks to both our Office Administration Team and Camp K Team for making this magic happen – we are so fortunate to have caring, dedicated and skilled individuals who literally "worked their butts off" to ensure each and every Camper had the best time ever!

Keep in mind that now the work begins of searching for funding for these supports with applications and earning funds through our Raffle Tickets, 50/50 Sales at both the Ottawa 67's and Ottawa Senators games – as well as other activities and events that will take place over this Fall, Winter and Spring. Hope you can help!

SOCIAL SKILLS GROUPS FOR TEENS WITH ASPERGER'S SYNDROME (AND RELATED DIAGNOSES)



The Typical Teens social groups have been running since 2003, and focus on experiential learning of social skills in a fun and sociable teen environment.

The groups provide community-based social skills training for teens with Asperger's and related diagnoses (HFA, PDD, NVLD). The strength of the TT model is the inclusion of trained peer mentors, supported by the arms-length facilitation of the adult group leaders, creating an authentic "real world" teen social situation that includes full support for the learning of new skills and the generalization and consolidation of previously acquired social knowledge.

After 10 years, Sheila Bell, Nancy Good and parent volunteer Heather Pierscianowski will be taking a step back from running the Typical Teens Groups (although they will still be consulting!).

Currently we are looking at offering only 1 Group per term, run by SLP Kim Lee and EA Amanda Dzuba. They will alternate between an East and West end location, depending on demand. Each group will run for 8 weekly sessions, Fall, Winter and Spring.

We invite interest from both past and new participants – and, depending on the response, will look to start a group in October. Please express your interest by emailing car@childrenatrisk.ca and include your child's name, age and grade in school.

USING VISUALS TO MAINTAIN A CONNECTION by Judy Endow, MSW



As an <u>autistic</u> my connections to other people are perceived visually. In fact, I often need to have a concrete visual available in order to be able to think about my friends. A challenge I am often faced with is the erroneous presumption and resulting behavior of neurotypical (NT) people when I need a visual in order to maintain a relationship. Individuals with other isms may also experience this erroneous presumption.

Being a Visual Thinker

For those of us who are visual thinkers it seems logical that visuals would play an important part in developing relationships with others and in maintaining those relationships over time. In fact, many of us need something we can actually see such as a picture of a person or

a concrete object representing that person. We do not decide to need this, but rather it is the way our autistic neurology makes information available and connections possible for us.

My Experience Growing Up

As for myself, I need a visual in order to think about a person or to pull up a conversation I had with a person. When I was a child I would sneak something of mom's to take with me to <u>school</u> such as a discarded Doublemint gum wrapper. If I didn't have some sort of visual reminder of mom with me it caused me to feel as if she did not exist – like she had died. When this happened it was hard to concentrate and figure out what my teachers wanted me to do.



My Challenges as an Autistic Adult

It seems to be difficult to get NTs to understand this phenomenon, but when this happens it is as if the out of sight person is no longer alive. I need a visual placeholder in order to maintain my connection with another person. Often times when I am brave enough to make this need known I have been laughed at or in some other way ridiculed. It is thought to be babyish and I have been admonished to "grow up."

I do not understand this reaction of others, but have experienced it many times over the years. It is not at all helpful. It does not honor my neurology and it does not allow me to participate in relationships. It seems to be difficult for NTs to imagine relationship connections to be any way other than the way that works for them – which does not typically include a picture or object reminder of a friend in order to maintain the bond of connection.

Solutions

- It is helpful to work with this neurology by providing a picture of an important person such as a parent for a child anxious over a pending separation. In my practice many a grieving student has been helped during the beginning of the school year by having a small photo of a parent taped inside his cubby, desk, locker or on the back page of an assignment notebook. Anxiety is reduced and learning ensues when a student is not grieving.
- Some children can learn to draw or write something that can serve as a placeholder for an out-of-site person.

An example from my own life is this poem and acrylic painting I created:







- If you are an NT don't poke fun, tease of or shame an autistic or other person with an ism for having a need imposed by his neurology. Besides being mean, it is not helpful and does not support relationship development.
- If you are a visual thinker don't belittle or put yourself down for a fact of your neurology. If you need something to serve as a visible placeholder for a person who is out of sight and want to explain this to another person feel free to print off and use this blog as an explanation.

Summary

"Regardless of how or where I get my visual, the fact remains that I need some sort of visual in order to experience the fact that I am connected to another person through the bond of friendship. This doesn't make sense to most people, but I have learned not to let that bother me these days! I do what makes sense to my neurology to maintain and participate in friendships. My closest friends tend to be people who do not question this peculiarity but instead join with me in honoring it." (Endow, 2013)

Camp Kaleidoscope 2013

Camp Kaleidoscope 2013 was yet another great success for Children at Risk – just much bigger in every way than we had anticipated!

Over the 5 weeks, we provided 230 Camp slots from the 247 requested, for 101 Campers with a staff of 57 Camp Counsellors and Volunteers. This offered respite and peace of mind to 95 families.

At Camp there were four distinct groups: Monkeysour youngest age range, Dragons-our mid age range and Titans or the name of the week decided by the Campers for the Teens and older Campers looking for more challenging activities. In addition we had the Lightning Bolts with teens that required more assistance with life skills. One week we had so many Dragons that the Group divided into Red and Blue Dragons each with their own room!



Not only is Camp Kaleidoscope a day camp where parents are comfortable in the knowledge that experienced staff are accommodating their child and making close connections by being 1:1 but also where every effort is made to have the camper have the best possible time. In our quest to provide our Campers with a great summer day camp experience, we had a packed program both on and off site. Thanks to the contribution of donations and Canadian Tire money from our membership, we were able to purchase an 11x8 foot oval SpringFree trampoline for all campers to enjoy. We also treated ourselves to a 12 foot inflatable waterslide that was used by those 150 lbs and under – we tested this

with Camp staff "test dummies" and determined that over 150 lbs you could get hurt – you also got fabric burns if testing it without water - The lengths Camp Counsellors went for their Campers and Camp!! ©



We also had access to a number of splash pads and water games, which greatly contributed to the excitement onsite. You didn't always need to get wet to enjoy activities, a great deal of fun was also had through mad science cause and effect activities and some crazy but creative crafts as well as the treasured canvas's the younger campers decorated and older ones wrote messages and signed as a lasting reminder of a great summer.

In addition, there were also the long standing favourites such as the Campers decorating their own Camp T shirts, fun in the Gym with the scooters and plasma cars, shopping trips to the local Mall to buy the ingredients for the cooking and baking opportunities which ranged in complexity depending on the group.



Each Camp group also had their favourite activities. The Titans made papier-mâché masks and their own parachutes and tried them out from the top of the play structures – for toy characters not themselves!



The Dragons were the kings of the messiest mad science activities and also loved the scavenger hunts whether it be finding something for each letter of the alphabet or finding the hidden dinosaur eggs.



The Monkeys would go out on Bug Hunts and could be heard laughing whilst enjoying Group Leader Melanie's Angry Bird Game and their most favourite activity the whistling balloons. The Lightning bolts would do puzzles or chill with soft music or being read to.



As well as going off site to the Gloucester Pool twice a week there was also a mid-week trip to a local attraction with the WUBS buses being divided up by age and ability so everyone got the best experience.

Week 1 - The rain storm was moving West to East so although the campers were concerned about the torrential rain at our Camp location, the word went out that the Directors had called Mother Nature and

everything would be fine. We headed West and had a lovely sunny day.

One Group had Saunders' Farm almost exclusively to themselves – here pictured on the wagon ride.



The 2nd Group had great fun at Karters Korners on the Go Karts, playing mini putt, basketball or going through a bucket of balls at the driving range.



Week 2 - It was the heat that was the issue so we had to go somewhere with air conditioning. The Museum of Nature provided IMAX movies, big Dinosaurs to the tiniest of Bugs, so something for almost everyone.



Week 3 - The Monkeys went to Monkey around for Jungle Gym and a pizza lunch and everyone not afraid of boats went to Dows Lake for Paddle boating, canoeing, kayaking and a particularly challenging scavenger hunt. Some of the Lightning bolts enjoyed the pool at Brewer Park and then everyone all met up at Brewer Park for some fun at the Splash Pad!



Week 4 - We returned to Saunders Farm but with many different Campers and those that had gone week 1 this time got to go to Karters Korners to be mini Mario's. There are some that were naturals, others I wouldn't be lending my keys too!



Week 5 – This is a difficult week as only 4 days and the last day we also have to be packed up and out of the school even though it takes us two-three days to move in and set-up. We had a terrific time being the guests of Sue Clark at the Arnprior Fair. The Midway staff donated two hours of their time to man the rides and side stalls, local businesses donated food so everyone had hot dogs, bags of chips, ice cream bars or popsicles and plenty of bottles of water.



As well as enjoying the Fun House, Crazy slide, Ferris wheel, Flying Carpets, merry-go-round, and other fast and furious rides, Campers checked out the petting zoo and were entertained with live music over lunch. Simba added the Camp K touch with one of his wrap numbers for all those present to enjoy. Video can be seen on our Facebook page.



Pack-up day, everyone went to Skyzone where we had exclusive use of the facility. There was lots of bouncing off the walls and into the foam pit. Camp Counsellors had as much fun doing flips as the campers, if not more according to the picture!

Expecting to have more rain, there were many planned activities that we didn't need to fall back on but we'll have the supplies ready for Saturday Fun Club sessions!!

This is one of many areas where we do not need to be concerned with constant phone calls to us to "deal" with our child because he is being disruptive as we have had to face over and over again with numerous other camp settings. If it were not for Camp Kaleidoscope, we would find ourselves at a loss as to where to place our son during the summer, particularly where a 1:1 respite or similar worker would be much more costly and would not involve the many activities and opportunity for socialization as Corey receives through Camp Kaleidoscope. We are extremely thankful that there is now a place for our son where he is happy and continues to learn and grow despite his many challenges. HELPING FAMILIES HELP THEMSELVES

Concerned about your adult child's future? Need a safety net in place for life's eventualities? Wish you had concrete strategies for common concerns?

We can *HELP* - we offer *Harmonization and Empowerment through a Living Plan*.

Tired of relying on someone else for answers? We believe YOU know what's best for YOUR family. Sometimes all you need is a fresh perspective.

We (Angèle Jodouin and Melodie Grealy-Fredette) are both Developmental Services Workers, graduated with honours from Algonquin College in 2003. We then founded **Family Harmonies Familiales** in 2006. Having had personal experience dealing with special needs in our families, and through volunteering and related jobs from a young age, we have now had the privilege of over 15 years working with families, helping them to reach their goals.

Through our varied experiences working in the field, we found that frequently parents were lacking the guidance and education that could enable them to offer better support to their children and also make the best use of their meager funds. We observed a great void in terms of tangible assistance for parents, other caregivers and the rest of their network; not enough explanation of treatments and/or interventions. It seemed that parents were always reliant on someone else to come in and "fix" things for them, without understanding how or why. Stemming from that, grew our convictions that families ultimately know what's best for them, and that given the right tools, they can bring harmony to their own situations.

So we developed an alternative to continual intervention: Harmonization - our approach to problem-solving and improving interactions. It consists of a detailed customized and practical plan that we call a "Living Plan", which addresses various goals in different areas (social, behavioural, communication, motor skills, life skills, etc). We create and include some fun and functional "Interaction Aids" (such as charts and reward systems) to help everyone keep track of progress. We also provide ongoing implementation support to help parents and others understand the why and how of all these tactics, and learn the skills to apply future changes.

Along with the Living Plans described above, we also help clients to build Life Plans. A Life Plan is created to set in place people and supports to deal with future eventualities such as the death of a parent. Several other organizations in Ottawa offer these as well, but they are generally very costly, and well beyond the means of most average families. Only a small part of Passport dollars (government funding) can be allocated to that end, and the final cost can be too much for many families to afford.

So, we came up with a different option.

We are happy to announce that we are providing a cost-effective way to create these plans through our Spring 2014 Workshop (6weeks/30hrs). It will allow families to reap the benefits of one-on-one focus, and working as a group.




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
