2014 will mark the 35th Anniversary of Children at Risk, Ottawa. In 1979, a concerned group of dedicated Parents saw the need and vision of a local, federally registered charity that would provide Services and Supports to children diagnosed with Autism and their families.

Like the traditional 35th anniversary symbol of coral, Children at Risk has grown and developed over the years – adapting to the needs of the Autism Community, identifying the "gaps" and looking to fill those gaps with critically-important programs. Join me in 2014 to recognize Children at Risk's 35 years of Service to Ottawa!

Saturday Fun Club

From November 2012 to March 2013, with funding from the City of Ottawa's Community Project Funding, Children at Risk initiated Saturday Fun Club Activity/Respite Sessions on 8 Saturdays. With funding from the Community Foundation of Ottawa, we repeated this support this Fall, with 7 Saturdays from September to December.

Utilizing management and counsellors from Children At Risk's Camp Kaleidoscope, we used many of the activities that proved so successful at Camp. Each Fun Club session runs for 5 hours, 10 AM to 3 PM, for children and youth aged 4 to 18+ years of age.

For the Winter and Spring 2014, we are planning 9 Saturday Fun Club sessions, with the first on January 25th. We are opening up Registration for Fun Club to all families. If your child has attended Camp Kaleidoscope in 2013, an intake will not be necessary. However, if your child is new to Children at Risk and/or attended Camp in 2011 or 2012, we would require an intake.

Please complete the enclosed Fun Club Registration and submit to Children at Risk by December 20th. (Note that due to the Location, Environment and availability of appropriate staff, we may not be able to accommodate some of our more challenged ASD youth that have had success at our Summer Camp.)

MARCH BREAK 2014

Similar to Camp Kaleidoscope and Saturday Fun Club, in 2013 we launched a 4-day March Break Camp for 25 ASD children with great success!

We are pleased to announce a 5-Day March Break Camp for 2014, for up to 30 ASD children and youth. It will run from March 10-14, 2014 from 9 AM to 4 PM daily. The cost will be \$300 and a current Children at Risk Membership of \$30.

Please complete the enclosed Registration – Applications will be accepted on a first-come basis, with limited spacing by age groupings. Note that we cannot accept candidates for the March Break unless they have attended either Camp or Fun Club, as we are unable to have an intake for March Break. Confirmation is completed with full payment.

FOUNDATION AWARDS \$700,000 TO 5 LOCAL CHARITIES



The Ottawa Dragon Boat Foundation has committed \$700,000 to five local charities. Foundation and Festival CEO, John Brooman, says, "We are pleased to announce our commitments to Children at Risk, Ottawa; Heartwood House; Helping with Furniture; Shepherds of Good Hope and; Youth Services Bureau of Ottawa as our recipients and partners for the 2014-15 seasons. This support will provide funding for programming for homeless youth, a summer day camp for autistic children, furnishing

homes for those in need, a facility supporting 18 grass root charities, and, helping men transition from the streets to the workplace.

Foundation past chair, Sandy Foote says "Our selection committee and board are excited to present this excellent mix of charities that provide direct support to our community.

We look forward to telling our paddling community and supporters more about the programs being funded by their work".

According to Brooman, the Tim Hortons Ottawa Dragon Boat Festival is the largest free festival and festival fundraiser in the National Capital Region. "As I joined the organization 10 years ago, the charitable Foundation was being created, thanks to generous support of paddlers and donors." Foote adds, "Everyone can support these charities through our on-site Silent Auction, the Tiki Beach Gala, and other onsite opportunities or through donations which may be made on-line or in-office year 'round. Any additional funds we raise beyond our \$700,000 will also go back to these five charities."

34 cup unsalted butter, room temperature 1cup all-purpose flour ½ cup icing sugar (sifted if there are lumps!) ½ cup cornstarch

Combine all ingredients in a bowl. Best mix is done by Child Nursery School at 2 ½ years of age – and he hand to need the dry ingredients into the butter. Roll into about 1" balls and place on ungreased cookie sheets (I use double layer aluminum sheets, as it cooks slower and less chance of burning). Using a fork, flatten each cookie somewhat. > Bake slowly at about 310-315 degrees Fahrenheit (do not use convection). Turn trays around at least once for even baking. They can take upwards of 15 minutes to bake – I do not really time them, but do what I call the "squeeze" test – if they are soft when gently squeezed on the outside, let them bake a little more until just firm. Do not overbake – they should be only lightly tanned on the bottom – not brown. Remove to plates for cooling, then store in left-over containers. They do freeze well, too, in case you want to get started early, but ensure they are still around by the time the holidays hit - asthese cookies left unattended, will disappear...!

News -The classic Cinderella's castle at Walt Disney World's Magic Kingdom made the little girls gasp and mouths drop open.

"This way to the princesses," said the guide, an elderly man who told the girls to call him Grandpa Joe.

The six little girls, members of a group of children selected to travel from Ottawa to Orlando, Fla. with the Dreams Take Flight program, wasted no time making their way across the amusement park, stopping only to point at the rides and Disney characters.

"You look enchanting," one of the little girls said to Princess Aurora.

"It's so romantic," said another.

The girls were just some of the 110 local children who travelled with Dreams Take Flight, a Canadian program that takes deserving children from a variety of backgrounds on a trip to Disney World.

Several children on the Sept. 24 flight had a sibling with autism or their own medical issues. Others live in foster care, or their family's income prohibits trips like this.

But Dreams Take Flight allowed the children to fly, eat, spend a day a day at Disney World and pick out a special souvenir to take home thanks to donations.

The program was started by Air Canada staffers, who volunteer their time - including the pilot who flew the day trip's plane - to take children in small groups around the park.

Most of the kids had never been on an airplane or outside Canada.

Many of the children agreed that it was one of the best days of their lives.

Hunter Donnelly-McPhail's mom saved news of the surprise trip for Aug. 18, his birthday.

"I couldn't stand up any longer, I had to sit down," he said about when he first heard he was headed to Disney World. The flight - his first ever - was almost too much excitement to handle for Hunter, who wants to be a flight attendant. The volunteer flight crew, dressed in Disney costumes, made him an honourary flight attendant for the day. He followed the attendants up and down the aisles as he handed out chips and candy.

None of the children had ever been to Disney World, but almost all of them were eager to ride the roller coasters. Splash Mountain was easily the children's favourite ride.

Towards the end of the day, as a train full of Dreams Take Flight kids and volunteers cruised into the end of the Big Thunder Mountain Railroad, it was clear that the kids were having a special day, as cheers of "dreams take flight" echoed through the boarding area.

Taequan Moise was all smiles the entire day, from the time he arrived at Disney World waving at the volunteers, to the plane ride home when he was one of the only children awake on the plane ride home.

Taequan said he could probably stay home from school to rest after the 20-hour day trip, but he wanted to tell his friends about his day.

"I would tell them about the rides, but about the food mostly. Fries, burgers, hot dogs," he said.

The kids had an early start to their day, arriving at the airport at 4 a.m. at a private hangar.

They travelled in style, receiving a police escort straight to the theme park once arriving in Orlando.

They received VIP treatment: fast passes that ushered them to the front of lines on all the Disney rides throughout the day and a brand new outfit of donated shoes from Crocs and clothes from Mark's Work Wearhouse.

While there were a few skinned knees and tears from first-time flyers, the number of smiles and looks of disbelief far outnumbered any frowns.

Many only needed one word - "amazing", "best" or "great" - to describe their day, a dream come true, as they slowly came down from the sugar high and dozed to sleep on the plane ride home.

"It was really, really, really fun," said Hunter. "From a scale from one to 10, it would be a thousand million. A thousand million and one."

LOVE IS ALL YOU NEED WITH AUTISTIC CHILDREN (OR THANKS GOD)

I was doing laundry with my 19 year-old son Alex, an autistic adult, listening to "All you Need is Love" by the Beatles when I was thinking that was exactly what my son Alex needs, needed in the past and will need in the future, i.e. love. We did not do the concentrated teaching for my autistic son called the Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA). We did not have the \$40,000.00 a year or so it would have taken. We also did not have the means for my husband or me to take a leave of absence to coordinate the concentrated teaching (ABA). To get this specific teaching from the government, our son would have had to be 6 years old and younger. At that time, Alex was 6 years old and a few months (maybe 3 months). He was simply not eligible to receive the training, nor was he eligible to be on the list. So, we just loved our son unconditionally, taught him the best we could (with some sign language, symbols, etc) and rolled with the punches of life. We only had one son, so we could fully focus on him.

Alex did not speak until about 14 months when his first word was cow. Everything was a cow. He did learn about 5 other words, but stopped talking at 15 months. He did speak again at the age of 6. The words were few, but precious. I had dreamt of him talking. My dream came true.

He received the diagnosis of autism at the age of 3. At 4 years old, he got the diagnosis of severe autism. After the first diagnosis, we thought there was no future for Alex, no marriage, no kids, no career, no job. But God was always there, looking out for us, helping us through each step of life. Thanks God!

At 7 years old, Alex was frustrated and violent. He became violent towards things and people. He threw furniture at me. I became fearful for my life. I have to say since then, he only was violent towards things i.e. punching the wall. My husband repaired the wall with him to teach him the consequences of his actions.

At 8 years old, in May 2002, we found an exceptional Special Needs Worker, Cassie, who became very important in our family's lives. She is still with us, 11 years later. She explored the world of Alex and had some very significant input to give him. Alex is a better person for knowing Cassie.

He is 19 now and does not become violent anymore towards things or people. He is gentle, he says please and thank you. We are very pleased with him. He is my angel that God sent to me and I appreciate having a son like him, autistic or not. He is more independent than ever, he understands more and more. He is becoming a delightful adult. Thanks God! And for receiving love from Alex, thanks God again!

Our son is not perfect, like any one of us who does not have autism. He is still loud sometimes, he shouts, but that does not bother me anymore. He has other weaknesses, like any of us, but he also has strengths. Thanks God!

I am writing this to show it is worth giving love to autistic kids. They come through for us at one point or the other in our life. In our case, he has been a good adult, mostly a good teenager. I am sure he will always be a good adult. He has some extraordinary ability to adapt to change, something we thought he would never do in his life. Change is usually hard for an autistic person.

I want to thank God for being there every step of the way with my husband, my son Alex, and me. God goes through the very difficult periods of our lives with us, even when we are not aware of it. Thanks God!


