EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

2018 has been VERY busy so far. Starting with the New Year's Gala - we have "rolled" into 2 Bowling Fundraisers, a Dart Tournament, an Ice Fishing Derby, an Awards Gala Silent Auction, March Break Camp and coming up on our 5th of 10 Winter/Spring Saturday Fun Club Respite Sessions.

PHEW – have not yet caught my breath!! I am currently knee deep in Spring Raffle Donation Requests (we welcome any and all Gifts of Merchandise and Certificates), we have another Dart Tournament with **The** Difference Makers - Les Faiseurs de Différence coming up on April 22nd and Camp Kaleidoscope Registrations are now being launched for 2018.

As we had indicated for several months, the rise in the I 2017 FALL RAFFLE TICKETS Ontario Minimum Wage on January 1, 2018 to \$14 from \$10.40 in October 2017 has impacted the Cost of ALL our Programs. Our Contract Counsellors and Facilitators are our Greatest Resource - therefore our Greatest Expense then, as well. For the 1st time in our 8 Years of Camp Kaleidoscope, we now are having to charge a nominal amount for Before and After Care, as well as a significant increase in the Camp Fees. While we are still holding Fundraising Events and Activities to subsidize the Cost of our Programs – we are already starting a slow transition to phase out some of these due to low participation and high effort required to stage them.

Emphasis is being put more to 3rd Party Fundraisers, Funding Applications and efforts for sustainable, renewable funding. We are delighted to announce that our Efforts with **Making Voices Count** (and those of our Members and Supporters too!) have resulted in a **Grant** of \$10,000 from The City of Ottawa for a 1-Time Community Projects Funding Application. Funding not in the City Budget since 2013, we are hopeful that this might lead to more City Funding in the Future! However, in the meantime – we gratefully accept any and all Opportunities that can be offered by the Community to be a Recipient Charity for a Fundraising Event or Activity!!

Children at Risk is delighted to have become a Charity Partner with **Kids Up Front Foundation Ottawa**. Kids Up Front is a registered charity, who's program helps deserving children and families in the National Capital Region. Their program collects unused event tickets and redistributes those opportunities to children and youth who otherwise wouldn't have the chance to attend due to socioeconomic barriers.

Kids Up Front was founded 17 years ago after a man named John Dalziel went to a Flames game at the Saddledome in Calgary and saw hundreds of empty seats. He figured that people had tickets to the event, and that purchased tickets were going unused. That is when the idea for Kids Up Front was born. The organization has grown immensely with locations in Calgary, Edmonton, Vancouver, Toronto, and now their expansion to Ottawa.

Since January, Children at Risk has received hundreds of tickets to Hockey Games (both Ottawa Senators and Ottawa 67's), Concerts, Movies, Plays, Museum Passes with their weekly – and sometimes daily – offerings for our Families. It has been wonderful to receive emails and thank-you notes from so many happy Families –



GEORGE & SON'S UPHOLSTERY



Bacon-Topped Guacamole



With NHL playoffs around the Corner and the weather still not up to spending time outdoors — I thought a couple of snack recipes might be good for those gathering to watch games or binge watch movies or shows!

- 3 fully ripe avocados, mashed
- 1 tomato, seeded, chopped, divided
- 1/4 cup Italian Dressing
- 1 jalapeño pepper, seeded, chopped
- 8 slices cooked bacon, crumbled (turkey bacon can be substituted for pork bacon)

Combine avocados, 1/4 cup tomatoes, dressing and peppers. Spoon into serving bowl. Top with bacon and remaining tomatoes.

Serving Suggestion

Serve with tortilla chips and/or cut-up fresh vegetables.

How to Select Avocados

Select avocados of uniform colors and free of cracks. Don't buy avocados with dark, sunken spots in irregular patches or cracked surfaces. It is best to buy avocados when they are firm. Then, place them in a brown paper bag and let them ripen at room temperature. Avocados should be just ripe, and should have a buttery consistency and a mild flavor.

Special Extra - Stir 2 Tbsp. chopped fresh cilantro into the guacamole before topping with bacon and tomatoes.

Cheesy Refried Bean Dip



- 1 tub (227 g) Philadelphia Creamy Cheddar Cream Cheese Product
- 1 cup canned refried black beans
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/2 cup grape tomatoes, chopped
- 2 green onions, chopped

Heat oven to 350°F. Mix cream cheese product, beans and garlic until blended. Spoon into 1-L casserole dish sprayed with cooking spray. Bake 25 to 30 min. or until heated through. Top with tomatoes and onions.

Serving Suggestion

Serve with tortilla chips.

Special Extra

Garnish with sour cream and chopped fresh cilantro just before serving.

Make Ahead

These dip ingredients can be mixed together ahead of time. Refrigerate up to 24 hours before baking as directed, increasing the baking time to 35 min. or until dip is heated through. Top with tomatoes and onions.

How to Use the Remaining Canned Refried Beans

The 1-cup measure of refried beans used in this recipe is about half of a 19.2-fl oz/546-mL can. Spoon leftover beans into airtight container. Refrigerate up to 3 days. (Or for longer storage, freeze in freezer-weight resealable plastic bag up to 2 months.) Use as a filling for tacos or burritos. (If frozen, thaw overnight in refrigerator before using as desired.)



No need to clean your house for a Baby-sitter – just drop off your children at our Offices – and enjoy up to 4 ½ hours of purely Adult time!

Activities include playing games in the gym, Nerf games, Wii, Kinect, making snacks, a movie for those that can sit through one. There will be Dedicated Staff for both Siblings and those with ASD. 6 p.m. to 10:30 p.m.

WHEN:

WHERE:

Children at Risk, 235 Donald Street, Suite 209

WHY.

Opportunity to offer Respite for your ASD child (ages 4-18+) and Siblings (ages 3-14+). We would have Gym games, scavenger hunt style games, glow in the dark activities for the first two hours and then settled down to a movie or gaming. For those that can't watch a movie there would be more Gym activities or crafts. We will offer snacks, but do request that your children have dinner before arriving!

HOW:

Cost is \$55 for each ASD child and \$30 for each Sibling. If your ASD child has not attended our Summer Camp or Saturday Fun Club, we will need to arrange an Intake Meeting to properly document their needs. Please complete the attached Registration and Email back or Fax. If Siblings are attending, please also complete the Sibling Form so we have info on them too!

We must have at least 20 children booked to offer this support. Booking and Payment will be required in advance – though we may be able to accommodate last minute Registrations depending on demand.

A current Children at Risk Membership (\$40 per annum) will also be required for Insurance Liability purposes.





Summer Day Camp 2018

Children at Risk will again be offering an **all Day Summer Camp** for children diagnosed within the Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) for the Summer of 2018. Graciously, **The King's Daughters & Sons (Ottawa City Union)** have agreed to continue as our Major Funder – and along with a donation from **the Unity for Autism Foundation**, HOPE Volleyball BeachFest, fundraising and other private donors, plans are again for 5 weeks of Camp this summer!

Individuals with any level of Autism have difficulty with Summer Camps due to their social and communication deficits as well as their unique behavioural challenges. Add in "Severe" Autism and "High Needs" and the situation is immeasurable in complexity. To adequately service the target clientele the camp needs to be a "specialized camp".

We would also like to note here that we differentiate between level of functionality and need, as we had many Campers last year who had diagnosis of high-functioning Autism and/or Asperger Syndrome – but also were high-needs due to behavioural challenges, often making it difficult for them to participate in a camp for typically-developing children.

Children at Risk's objectives with a Specialized Camp is to provide a recreational camp which, through expertise and proven techniques, will accommodate the deficits of autism such as communication, socialization and behaviour seamlessly whilst allowing the Camper to have the stimulation, excitement and fun that summer camp is renowned for and an understated right of any child regardless of the severity of their disability. Too often children with severe Autism are denied access to programs and/or if access is granted, the parent must pay extra to send a 1:1 worker. This discriminates against a child with higher needs and penalizes both the child and their family by not having this opportunity that is available for typically-developing children!

Our Camp Spaces are limited - with plans for only 50-55 children per week.

Our Camp employs qualified, experienced staff and offers a 1:1 and 2:1 supervision ratio. Ages 4-20+.

Cost: With the high level of supervision and experienced staff, the cost per Camper for Camp Kaleidoscope's per 5-day week is \$1,200. However, due to the generous funding of our donors – who, along with Children at Risk, wish to assist the Autism Community families with camp opportunities that are affordable and accessible, we are able to offer the following rates: \$550 for Full Week, \$440 for 4-day week.

Summer Day Camp 2018 (Cont'd)

ALL Camp Applications will require a Deposit of \$75 that will be applied to Camp Fees/Membership.

NEW - Due to the additional administration required – billings to a 3rd party funder (Service Coordination, Children's Aid, etc.) will be subject to a \$20 fee.

NEW - Campers new to Children at Risk will only be offered a **Maximum of 2 Weeks** of Camp to start, due to the High Demand.

If you would be looking for additional weeks and we have Staff and Space Available – we may be able to offer them - but only after Camp has begun.

Intake Interviews will take place prior to confirmation of Registration.

2018 Camp Weeks: July 9-13, July 16-20, July 23-27, July 30 – August 3, August 7-10

Camp Location: St Paul School, 2675 Draper Ave, Nepean/Ottawa, ON K2H 7A1 West-Central Ottawa.

Times: Camp 9 AM to 4 PM, - before and after care available 8 AM to 4:45 PM can be offered at a flat rate of \$50/5 day week, \$40/4 day week

Please see the attached application for more details! Returning Campers only need to complete the 1-Page Application. New Campers must complete as well a detailed Intake Form (to be supplied).

Applications for NEW Campers will be taken up to April 27, 2018 (please complete both forms), Returning Camper Applications are due May 4, 2018 (complete short form).

The Camp will address three main areas:

- 1. **The Camper** Provide a safe, accommodating, non-judgemental day camp for the Autistic child. Provide the camper with the opportunity to improve social skills, sense of autonomy, leisure skills and play repertoires and possibly make life-long friendships. Objectives include:
 - * Maintaining or improving the child's functioning level
 - * Maintaining or improving existing skills and/or to develop new skills
 - * Continuing the child's school program or routine
- 2. **Parents & Siblings -** Benefit parents by allowing them the reduced stress from knowing that their child is with understanding individuals who will accommodate their child and not expel them from camp for the slightest infraction of social behaviour. This also provides the parent the benefit of knowing that they have a number of weeks where they can maintain their normal working hours and not use up their full annual vacation time to supervise their child. Also to provide families with the opportunity to spend dedicated time with Siblings that in many families, unintentionally suffer due to the demands of the child on the Spectrum.
- 3. **The Community** Extend Summer employment to Educational Assistants and provide EA's and Special Education Teachers with appropriate training pertinent to the ASD Spectrum and provide hands on application in real life situations that will benefit all children that they teach and especially those on the ASD Spectrum. Educate younger camp counsellors on the complexities of the ASD field and assist to make informed decisions about continuing in this area through higher education for i.e. ABA, OT, SLP employment or hands on activities.



Children At Risk would like to take what was working at Camp Kaleidoscope and further develop a program Neurotypical youth can be left home alone or go out with i specifically for the higher functioning Teenager who may be OK at home but whose parents don't want them on the electronics or home alone all day. We want to have a program that the youth want to attend and give them the opportunity to have a camp experience geared specifically to them and that they deserve. At the 2017 March Break Camp with the donation of some OC Transpo passes with a small group of appropriate Campers, we tried out an outings based week of activities which proved very successful. The Group went to the Gloucester Wave Pool, to the Lazer Quest, 10 pin bowling, saw a movie at St Laurent Mall and went shopping to Loblaws to buy ingredients to make a special lunch. At this year's March Break we also added in a day at the renovated Science and Technology museum.



At Camp K 2017,we decided to take it to the next level and have a group that could join in on some of the camps outings but also go out on independent trips again using donated OC Transpo passes to try activities more age appropriate. With Meghan Kyle on board as the Group Leader and a few key Counsellors "The Leadership Camp within the Camp" was devised.

The overall goal of the program for this trial year was to create a fun, social environment that was specifically geared towards teens. A space to have a fun summer camp experience that is at the heart of the Camp K philosophy. As among this group of Campers there are many that have the potential as future Camp K counsellors and leaders for the autism community and community at large it was decided to add activities that foster leaders of tomorrow through volunteering and community outreach to broaden a social awareness and create opportunities to collect high school volunteer hours and encourage job interest and community involvement.



A typical week for this ended up with activities that had the following components:

- ☐ Two to three outings per week via OC Transpo which included
- ✓ Flying Squirrel Trampoline Park
- ✓ Axe Throwing at Bad Axe Throwing
- ✓ Amnesia Escape room
- ✓ Mooney's Bay Beach
- ✓ Lansdowne Park
- ✓ Downtown to attend some of the 150 Canada Birthday celebration such as Continuum and Mosaii.
- ✓ Participation in the Busker Festival.
- ✓ Glebe and Downtown Scavenger Hunts

- ☐ Joined Camp K on WUBS scheduled bus trips where OC Transpo was impractical to go to
- ✓ Karters Korners for activities such as Go Karting, Mini Golf and the driving range.
- Mont Cascade Water Park which was a great day of slides and sun.

- ☐ One volunteer orientated experience each week which qualified for school volunteer hours such as :
- ✓ Shadowing counsellors and assisting in younger campers groups.
- ✓ Helping the kitchen coordinator with setting up and cleaning up after cooking activities.
- ✓ Volunteering at the local food bank where the Campers assisted in clean-up of the site including window washing.
- ☐ At least two trips to the Gloucester Wave Pool including at least one Wave swim.
- ☐ Developing Life skills
- ✓ Cooking and baking challenges such as creating a unique cookie recipe, extreme milkshakes and cereal bars. Each cooking challenge was executed in a collaborative small group with each group being given a budget of 2 dollars or less to buy a secret ingredient from the local grocery store.

- Expanding Independence with planning activities and working out the routes and times of bus routes to get to places in time for an activity but also making it back to Camp in time for parent pick-up.

- On site activities fostering social interactions and team building challenges which included:
- ✓ developing our own Escape Room with a break free of handcuffs challenge.
- ✓ A variety of Special interests that both Campers and Counsellors had in common such as Pokemon, Yugio and Dungeons and Dragons that promoted cooperative play and the sportsmanship of winning and losing. As teens, having time to pursue these relationship building activities is integral to group success.
- ☐ Assisting with Camp operating activities around the camp such as helping put up and take down the outside shelters and water equipment.

For 2018 we would like to explore more volunteer and community outreach opportunities that allow the campers to grow a sense of leadership and social responsibility in areas of interest such as with the SPCA, Food banks, shelters and other youth focused charities. How do you make a destination autism-friendly?



Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, has a busy boardwalk and all kinds of attractions, from mini-golf courses and water parks to a zip line and a Ferris wheel.

So it might not be an obvious destination for families with kids on the autism spectrum who may be easily overwhelmed by noise and commotion. But <u>an organization called Champion Autism Network</u> is working with hotels, restaurants and other venues to make the area autism-friendly.

"If you're going to invite the autism world to play with you on the beach, you have to have people be aware," said Champion Autism Network founder Becky Large, whose son is on the spectrum. "We've trained hotels, restaurants and others and it's really paying off."

Large started Champion Autism Network (CAN) in 2016, working with the Myrtle Beach airport to open a "quiet room" where kids could decompress from the stresses of air travel. She then began reaching out to local businesses, offering staff training. Families present a CAN card at participating venues as a way to discreetly signal their needs, and the businesses offer CAN families discounts and services like skipping the wait line.

"They show the card and the staff will know where to seat you, how to treat you," Large said. "They know it's possible there might be some awkward social behaviour. The person might become over stimulated. They might have to wrap up the food before it's even served."

The biggest takeaway from CAN's training? When kids on the spectrum "become over stimulated or have a tantrum or a meltdown, they're not just being naughty children that parents can't control," Large said. "Rather than being judgmental, recognize that this is a family in crisis. Offer a friendly hand and a smile."

Large founded CAN to serve locals, but some 450 families now have CAN cards from as far away as Minnesota, New York, Canada and Germany. Large has also fielded inquiries from other destinations looking to replicate the program. "I would like nothing better than if I could land a national chain to want to be the first autism-friendly hotel chain," she said.

How do you make a destination autism-friendly? (Cont'd)

John Ordover, who lives in Brooklyn, New York, was in Myrtle Beach the first week of April for a third visit. His teenage son Arren is "almost non-verbal and has a long list of requirements to make a hotel room safe," said Ordover, whose wife, Carol Greenburg, is co-editor of the "Thinking Person's Guide to Autism."

Hair dryers, irons, coffeemakers, glassware, pens and pencils must be removed and the toilet tank cover must be secured. But he had nothing but praise for Ocean Creek Resort, where they're staying: "They did a spectacular job with the room," said Ordover, adding that he's grateful to "have a place to take our son for spring break that he loves, where he is accepted, and where we don't have to constantly explain or apologize for him."

Ocean Creek Resort's general manager Sabrina Hilliard has a son with autism and makes CAN's training mandatory for her staff. "We can make the room as safe as possible," Hilliard said. "We can do curbside checkin. We can make special provisions in the restaurant, to make sure we have things stocked to meet their needs, and make arrangements with housekeeping to do services at times that meet their schedule."

CAN also has support from attractions like a bowling alley and Ripley's Aquarium, which host "sensory-friendly" events with modified lighting and sounds. A movie theatre hosts CAN families for monthly screenings of films like "Wonder Woman" where lights stay on, the sound is down and viewers can get up and move around.

CAN is also organizing an April 20-21 festival screening new films by or about someone with autism.

Hilliard's best advice for hospitality workers or anyone encountering a family coping with an overwhelmed child is simple: "Never judge. Go up and ask, 'Hey, is there anything I can help you with?' It's so much more meaningful than the stares and the 'oh, she can't control her kid' or 'that kid is being a brat.' Sometimes just a reassuring smile makes a difference."

ATTENDANT CARD FOR OC TRANSPO

Here is information from the **OC Transpo** website regarding a Card that can be obtained for those with a Disability who require the assistance of a Support Person to be able to travel on OC Transpo regular buses. We are asking ALL Families who have children that this would apply to if you can acquire this Pass. It will help significantly for costs associated with busing when we make some outings at Summer and March Break Camps – as this means that the Attendant does NOT have to pay – just the Client – AND we have been obtaining some passes from OC Transpo to help with those costs! Originally a Form had to be completed by a Health Care Professional – BUT I have been instructed that if you inform Children at Risk: The name of your child, your name and an email address. Which location OC Customer Service Centre (Lincoln Fields, Rideau Centre, St-Laurent and Orléans) you will be going to. An email confirmation will then be sent to both you and Children at Risk that you copy and take with you – it can be obtained under OC Transpo's Travel Training Program – no Doctor visit required! The more Families that can obtain this card – the better – please do ASAP!

Support Persons: OC Transpo will accommodate customers who need the help of a support person to use transit. Support persons can ride with you free of charge, however, you may need to present a Support Person Card to the operator when you board. NEW! If you use an assistive device, such as a wheelchair or scooter, you will need to obtain a Support Person Card for your support person to ride at no charge and to gain access through the upcoming fare gates. Support Person Cards have a photo of the customer, not the support person.

This allows you to bring different support persons with you at different times and on different trips.

Getting Your Support Person Card: To get your Support Person Card bring photo ID and your documentation indicating that you require a support person from an authorized health care professional to an OC Customer Service Centre (Lincoln Fields, Rideau Centre, St-Laurent and Orléans). Staff will take your photo and give you your Support Person Card at no charge. Please keep your documentation in case you lose or damage your card.
