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

#### GROUPS UPDATE

#### Friendship Social Skill Groups

Our winter session of Social Skill Therapy groups began in February, with 6 groups servicing children from ages 4 to 16. 4 groups are Site-Based at our Donald Street offices, 1 is Site-Based at the Independent Grocer in Barrhaven and 1 is Outing-Based for teens, visiting recreation venues around the city.

We have tried to accommodate as many new referrals as possible in the winter session. However, not all children were able to be offered a group, as the groups are compiled with similar levels of functionality and ages. We aim to try and incorporate as many of our new applicants as possible for upcoming groups, with a spring session commencing in May.

### <u>Life Skills for Asperger/High-Functioning</u> <u>ASD Children</u>

We are still planning a new group for Life Skills for Asperger/High-Functioning ASD Children, to commence in May. This group will offer a group approach for higher-functioning ASD children. Many children with higher needs are in special Autism

Units, where Life Skills is part of their curriculum. However, children that are integrated in regular classrooms do not have access to this skill development and we heard from families that it was often difficult due to time constraints/other family commitments for parents to set aside time to work on this area. This group would be held at our Donald St. offices, with sessions lasting 8 weeks, 2 hours each meeting, with topics like menu planning, meal preparation, housekeeping, hygiene, etc. The age range will be 10-13 years old.

#### Sibling Support Groups

Our **Sibling Support** groups are back! We re-started our groups just recently, with 8 - 13 year old sibs meeting on Tuesday nights and 4 - 8 year olds meeting on Saturday afternoons. Feedback has been overwhelmingly positive, with the recognition of the challenges of being a sibling in a household raising a child with Autism.

### Groups for Higher Needs Children

This group has been temporarily postponed. It is still the goal of Children at Risk to offer groups for ASD children with higher needs. Currently we do not have enough Facilitators to conduct these groups, but the Board of Directors will continue in its efforts to recruit qualified, experienced individuals. Recognition has been made that the structure of these groups would be different, with lower group enrollment numbers and also with ratios of 1:1 to address the children's higher needs/give more individual attention and direction. More info as it develops!

#### Activity-Based or Conversation-Based?

The spectrum that Autism presents causes challenges in planning Social Skill Groups to be effective interactive and successful. Being that, ASD children can present from high-needs, non-verbal to high-functioning Asperger Syndrome - and anywhere in between. Throughout the years, Children at Risk have attempted to hold groups that consist of a group of children of a similar age range and level of functionality. In an attempt to help all children on the spectrum, we have tried to incorporate some "midlevel" functioning children into groups with higher-functioning children. These children present with verbal skills, communication and interaction capabilities, but can with challenges comprehension involvement in conversation-based group activities. We have recently decided that these children would better benefit from an "activity-based" Social Skill Group with lower ratios of 4 children to 2 facilitators to allow for individual attention when needed. When children are referred to Children at Risk, we will be making an attempt to identify these children that would benefit from an "Activity-Based" Social Skill Group and hope to commence at least one of these groups in the spring or fall!

Along with this thought, Sheila Bell has also identified a similar group of teens. These teens are placed in the high school system in regular classes, but without many supports. Our Outing-Based Typical Teens group is hoping to plan a modified version for these teens in the fall!

#### CLUB RAP

CHRISTINE MARTELL -FACILATOR CAROLYN LAVIGNE -- CO-FACILATOR

Club Rap 4 is at the beginning of ten wonderful weeks of getting to know one another. Each session starts with a meet and areet and then we followed a schedule of activities to practice initiating participating in conversations, i.e.: making sense in a conversation, respecting body space, eye contact, not interrupting others, statements and gestures of encouragement, appropriate tone of voice, and facial expressions. We practiced how to have fun together, telling and understanding jokes or riddles, acting out social scenarios, and how to express yourself without hurting the feelings of others.

The kids are encouraged to share any concerns from their week and problem-solve together. It is very moving to hear them congratulate each other's triumphs and support each other's disappointments. Carolyn and I are impressed by how well the kids identified and respected each other's particular interests, and the small acts of kindness and friendship.

The last part of each evening consisted of a variety of games and creative projects requiring problem-solving, co-operation, listening and communication skills, both in the gym, around the table, and out in the community, to build a skill set for them to use at school with peers or at home with family.

Carolyn and I feel privileged to spend time with your children. Taking this journey with the kids always brightened our lives.

I am currently taking post-graduate courses in the Autism and Behavioral Science Program at Algonquin College. I have two beautiful children (one of whom is on the spectrum) and a wonderful husband. I am very excited and look forward to working with these families.

#### Nazima Khan

I have a BA in psychology and have worked in the field of neurobehavioural therapy in a clinical setting. I also have experience working with children on the ASD spectrum and have 9 years' experience at the Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario. I will be co-facilitating the younger sibling support group and look forward to bringing

my experience and upbeat nature to the group.

### Lisa Gregory

I am married and mother to three children one of whom has autism. Our family became involved with Children at Risk through our son's attendance at Thursday's Child Nursery School. During the past nine years, I have enjoyed volunteering for a variety of fund raising events and am enjoying assisting Liz Schissler as facilitator.

I have had the opportunity to both volunteer and work with children in different types of schools and daycare settings. I enjoy putting together language, social skills and math programs. I have successfully completed the Positive Behaviour Support Program at Algonquin College, April 19, 2005, graduating with honours. This program gives you the skills to work with children and adults requiring behaviour interventions to help them reach their potential.

During the last eight years, I have learned from and worked with many professionals. I have also been able to share what I have learned through the Algonquin College/Children at Risk Program by providing training to DSW (Developmental Services Worker) students.



#### SUMMER CAMPS REGISTRATION - CITY OF OTTAWA

As of <u>March 9, 2006</u> you can register your child into a summer program with the City of Ottawa. Their recreation guide is available on line at <u>www.ottawa.ca</u> or at your local community centers. The City will offer Shared Care support for children with mild to moderate needs and who may require support about 60% of the time. Shared Care is for children who can handle a 1 to 4 instructor/child ratio. Some additional funding may be accessed for a child with higher needs and who may require 1:1 care. It's a first come first serve basis, so early registration is encouraged.
