As the Holiday Season approaches, I hope you can find more time to spend with family and less time in the malls over the next few weeks. If we are able to help give you some much needed free time with your participation in our **Saturday Fun Club or Family Fun Night**, that brings us some happiness.

Our signature program, Camp Kaleidoscope, continues to be a very popular summer camp for our children. The inclusive nature and acceptance of children on the spectrum has been highlighted in many positive letters written by parents since we began the camp in 2011. We have certainly grown the number of spots and number of weeks the camp is offered, but our families have told us that we have maintained the service level and their children continue to look forward to their camp experience every summer. Our Saturday Fun Club Respite Sessions continue to be very popular with children and parents. The 5-hour respite program engages the children in a variety of activities in groups or one-on-one. It also provides a nice break for parents to do some shopping, go for lunch or just relax at home. The sessions typically run every other Saturday in the Fall and Winter. Parents are now able to use our ON-LINE Registration to book your sessions. We also have a Family Fun Night at various times throughout the year, which includes siblings. You can go to our website to find out the dates. Starting in January – we will have a NEW Outing-Based Group for Asperger and High-Functioning Teens modeled on the Camp Groups we called "Camp Within a Camp" or "Explorers". This will replace the former "Typical Teens" Group we have previously offered as it was getting difficult to recruit and retain Peer Mentors, as well as not as economically-effective for both the Charity and Families. We continue to have a number of regular fundraisers, including the Celebrity Pumpkin Contest. We used a mixed format of electronic bids and paper bidding on a select number of pumpkins. Overall, it was a successful event. I want to say a special thank you to **The Difference Makers** (**Les Faiseurs de Différence**) who have had several events to support Children at Risk over the past year, most recently a Dart Tournament which I attended. This was a lot of fun and had great participation from the community. I also want to thank **Costco** for their generous donations of food throughout the year. #### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE**

Brenda Reisch, Executive Director

Service to the Ottawa Community. 2020 will represent the Charity's 41<sup>st</sup> year. Sounds about time that we review the 4 W's and 1 H of Children at Risk!

- 1) WHO Children at Risk, Ottawa is a federally- I needed! registered Charity.
- 2) WHAT Children at Risk, Ottawa provides Programs, Services and Supports for children diagnosed within the Autism Spectrum Disorders and their Families.
- 3) WHEN Children at Risk, Ottawa operates year-round - with Saturday Fun Club and Family Fun Night Respite Services Winter, Fall and Spring, as well as March Break Camp. Our Flagship is our summer day camp, Camp Kaleidoscope, that runs for 5 weeks in July and August.
- 4) WHY Children at Risk, Ottawa is dedicated to "filling in the gaps" in government-funded services or other providers for Families raising a child with Many of our Programs are not offered elsewhere or are limited in availability.
- 5) **HOW** Children at Risk, Ottawa survives solely on Fundraising, Donations and Grants. Partial Fees are charged for Programs but costs of these Services are heavily subsidized.

As mentioned in our September Newsletter - we will be starting in the New Year to get our Families to unite for 2020 and help Children at Risk MAKE a concerted Effort to let not just our Local Members of Provincial Parliament know and understand the Critical Importance of this Funding - but ALL 124 MPP's in Ontario!

This means educating many on what the Provincial Government Ministry of Education "Focus on Youth I Funding" IS and what support it not only provides for both non-profit and charitable groups, but marginalized students as well...It is critically important that we keep the momentum for this Program and Funding going - in the minds and hearts of those who represent their constituents in ALL of Ontario.

#### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE (Cont'd)**

The alternative to NOT having a school available for Children at Risk, Ottawa is soon to complete 40 Years of I Camp K is most likely that it will NOT exist as we have known it for 9 Years! The Camp Budget does not include Rent for Facilities and this cost would price this support too high for most families...so we MUST "gather the troops" and fight for what is so very much

#### UNITY FOR AUTISM



#### What is a May Court Club?

It is a dedicated group of women whose mission is to improve the lives of those in their community who are less fortunate than themselves. Its members raise funds through various projects among which are thrift shops, house tours, Christmas tree raffles and fashion shows and galas.

It uses the money raised to provide financial assistance to needy organizations or individuals, with particular emphasis on health, high risk children and youth and school nutrition programs. It is also a group of volunteers who give 1000's of hours each year to make all their projects possible and productive, but also takes time for social events and friend raising.

#### **Purpose:**

The May Court Club of Ottawa aim is to provide assistance to smaller organizations in the local community who may not have access to professional fundraising resources. Grants are awarded from funds accumulated through fundraising projects such as special events, and from the Club's endowment and investment income.

Eligibility Criteria: The May Court Club of Ottawa supports social services, education and health-related issues with particular emphasis in the following areas:

- · High risk children and teens
- Literacy
- Nutrition
- Palliative and respite care
- Services for the disabled
- Services for seniors
- Single mothers and their children
- Women's health

Grants are made to organizations recognized by Canada Revenue Agency as registered charities. Organizations must be based in Ottawa or the projects must benefit residents of the local Ottawa community.

#### DIY Holiday Gift: Mickey Mason Jar Cookie Kit



Here's a sweet way to gift the joy of baking to a friend or teacher who also happens to love all things Disney. Prep the dry ingredients for the perfect holiday cookie, include a recipe, and add a little Mickey magic on top! Happy holidays!

#### What You'll Need:

- Mason Jar
- Black construction paper or cardstock
- Double-sided tape
- Red ribbon
- Twine

#### Dry Ingredients:

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 cups rolled oats
- 3/4 cup raisins
- 1/2 cup white sugar
- 1/2 packed light brown sugar
- 3/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

#### Mickey Mason Jar Cookie Kit (Cont'd)

#### To Assemble the Mickey Mason Jar Cookie Kit:

- 1. Measure out the above ingredients or the ingredients to a cookie recipe of your choosing. Layer the dry cookie mix ingredients inside a mason jar.
- 2. Cut a small pair of Mickey ears out of black construction paper or cardstock. Leave an inch of paper below the ears. Fold and attach to the top of the Mason jar with double-sided tape.
- 3. Tie a red bow around the Mason jar.
- 4. Cut a recipe card sized sheet of paper, write out the cookie recipe corresponding to the ingredients in the jar and attach to the mason jar with twine.

#### **Baking Instructions to Include with your Gift:**

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F.
- 2. In large bowl, cream together ½ cup butter and sugars until smooth. Beat in 2 eggs and ¾ tsp vanilla until fluffy. Gradually beat flour into your butter mixture. Stir in oats and raisins.
- 3. Chill your mixture in the freezer for 1-2 hours. Drop rolled teaspoonfuls of your mixture onto a cookie sheet.
- 4. Bake 10-12 minutes in the preheated oven, or until golden brown. Cool slightly, remove from sheet to wire rack, and then cool completely.

Since November 2012 - Children at Risk has been offering Saturday Fun Club Activity/Respite Sessions on Saturdays. We are opening up Registration for Fun Club to all families. If your child has attended Camp Kaleidoscope in 2019, an intake will not be necessary. However, if your child is new to Children at Risk and/or attended Camp in 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017 or 2018 - we would require an intake.

Utilizing management and counsellors from Children At Risk's Camp Kaleidoscope, we used many of the activities that proved so successful at Camp. Each Fun Club session runs for 5 hours, 10 AM to 3 PM, for children and youth aged 4 to 18+ years of age. SFC will not be exactly like summer camp, but with adequate and qualified support staff, your child/youth will have five hours of fun and creativity with peers. Organized activities will include but not limited to: Mad Science, Crafts, Computer Games, Gym Circuits, can turn Saturdays into the best day of the week! As at Camp, as well, activities will align with ability - allowing older participants to influence the content to have the best experience.

Ten Saturdays have been arranged for the Winter/Spring Session from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Sessions cost \$150+ to offer per child, but with donations & fundraising, we can offer each session at \$90 in advance to secure the dates offered to you. No additional subsidizes are available. A current Children at Risk Membership (\$40 per annum to January 1, 2020 – after January 1, 2020 it will be \$50 - with Pro-Rating to next January 1<sup>st</sup> date) will also be required for Insurance Liability purposes.

How many Saturdays each participant can be guaranteed will depend on the demand within the three age ranges – 4 to 8, 9 to 12 and 13 to 18 years of age. These ranges aren't fixed as participants will be grouped according to their best fit. As per the Registration Form, you can ask for some or all of the dates and we will confirm what we can offer once all the Registrations have been received and we can balance out each date with a mix of younger, older and level of needs corresponding to staff available. Spots are limited with only being able to accommodate 50 children.

Activities include playing games in the gym, Nerf games, Wii, Kinect, making snacks, a movie for those that can sit through one. There will be Dedicated Staff for both Siblings and those with ASD. 6 p.m. to 10.30 p.m.

WHEN: Saturday, June 13, 2020

WHERE: Children at Risk, 235 Donald Street, Suite 209

WHY: Opportunity to offer Respite for your ASD child (ages 4-18+) and Siblings (ages 3-14+). We would have Gym games, scavenger hunt style games, glow in the dark activities for the first two hours and then settled down to a movie or gaming. For those that can't watch a movie there would be more Gym activities or crafts. We will offer snacks, but do request that your children have dinner before arriving!

Children at Risk is pleased to announce a pilot program called "Do More, See More in Ottawa" - An exploration of the activities available in Ottawa that with the right level of support. With monies from a **City of Ottawa Community Recreation & Cultural Grant** – Children at Risk was able to offer 5 Weeks of this Support at Camp Kaleidoscope this summer and continue with 6 Sessions this Winter. This Group will be most appropriate for Asperger and High-Functioning Autism Teens 13-19 years of age. It will continue where our previously-offered Typical Teens Group left off – but more economically for both Families and the Charity!

It is Children at Risk's mandate to fill the gaps in existing services and as anyone with a teenager knows, it is very hard to find the right activities for teenagers, especially ones that get them out of bed at the weekends, off their electronics and that they want to participate in as it just isn't cool to go out with "The parents" anymore! This program as well as fun will foster positive social skills and social interactions as well as develop self-advocacy and confidence.

Children at Risk has successfully introduced the fun aspects of Ottawa to our Campers who attended our Camp within a Camp groups at March Break Camp and summer's Camp Kaleidoscope. This "Do More, See More In Ottawa" pilot program will benefit from crew who have trained with us at these programs and our Saturday Fun Clubs to support the adventurer participants.

The cost of the program is \$500. This is NOT like Saturday Fun Club where dates can be chosen – this is ONE Group that will attend ALL 6 Dates for the lump sum Cost.

A current Children at Risk Membership (\$40 per annum to January 1, 2020 – after January 1, 2020 it will be \$50 - with Pro-Rating to next January 1<sup>st</sup> date) will also be required for Insurance Liability purposes.

A Confirmation letter email will be sent on receipt of your completed application form.

Once the Application Date is reached – the Registration will close and Families will be notified shortly if their Teen is involved – partly due to not knowing what ages will Register.

The Program will operate on Saturday's once a month January to April and two dates in May but do not clash with our Saturday Fun Club dates. Drop off will be at our Donald Street headquarters with transportation to venues via OC Transpo. Pick-up maybe either from our office or a venue. The exact time on the Saturday will depend on the time that sessions' activity is available, so may include early evening. The first session will take place 10.30 a.m. to 3.30 p.m. This session will focus on getting to know one another and discussing ideas for places to visit on the remaining five sessions.

For the baking competition, each group of Explorers planned out a theme for their cake and decided on special ingredients to make their cake different from the rest. We then went shopping at the local grocery store where each team bought their special ingredients. We had three independent judges provide scores for the best Each day went by so fast and we always looked forward collaboration, most creative and best tasting cakes. 

#### Ontario Autism Program Advisory Panel – Or How I Spent My Summer

It has been an exhausting summer, and early fall. I've spent 18 days this summer meeting with my fellow Ontario Autism Program Advisory Panel, as well as 36 travel days. In the end, I'm pleased at what we have been able to come up with on a consensus basis from a group of 20 people with broad interests and perspectives. Our report has now been released by the government.

Some of the highlights of what we were able to achieve in our recommendations:

- Core Service inclusion of Occupational Therapy, Speech & Language, and Mental Health Services
- The inclusion of mental health services are a huge win, including
- Mental health available to all children while on the waitlist, while in core services and in crisis through urgent service
- Detailed recommendations to the Ministry of Health to direct mental health providers to accept autistic patients, and to learn how to serve the autistic population
- Strong recommendation that autistic adults be part of implementation committee
- Support for AAC and specific call out to non-speaking autistics.
- Transitional supports for youth transitioning to adult life
- A "Care Coordinator" that can provide assistance with system navigation and help connect families to available services in their area and help access funding sources outside of MCCSS.
- Urgent (crisis) process to help children and families in crisis who may need access to care and services at a more intense or urgent basis. Even if you are still on the waitlist for core services.
- Foundational family Supports such as caregiver education and training, workshops, information and resources that will be available even while families are on the waitlist.
- Entering core service and coming off the Waitlist should be sequential based on entry into the OAP, which should make this more transparent.
- Recognition that there is a different approach needed to serve the needs of rural, remote, Northern Ontario and Indigenous children. Also recognizing that they need to be represented in future consultations and panels.

I'm encouraged by the ministry staff involvement and the support of Minister Smith during this process. I'm equally hopeful that this collaboration to create this report will make it more likely that our recommendations will be adopted by the government and implemented for a launch of April 2020.

The views, perspectives and concerns of autistic people were heard, listened to and are reflected in the tone and content of this report. The seat at the table was respected, and more than that, welcomed and I thank the government for the opportunity and for my fellow panel members for accepting us as colleagues on this journey.

#### Ontario Autism Program Advisory Panel – Or How I Spent My Summer (Cont'd)

We still need to push for adult services. We had some discussions, but as it was not part of our terms of reference all we could do is strongly encourage the ministers to pursue services for adults, and members of all disabled communities. Minister Smith has been starting the process of meeting with adult autistics as well as other disability groups and self-advocates, and I'm encouraged by this.

I'm continuing my advocacy work as the new Director of Outreach with Autism Advocacy Ontario, and have been hard at work this fall in publishing our report on the Crisis in Special Education that we released to the Minister of Education in November. I have also been active in leading a coalition of disability advocacy groups across the country to push for a National Disability Strategy that includes supports for all disabilities at all ages with all needs, and we have been getting a lot of positive support amongst the new crop of recently elected MPs.

Again, I've been honoured to be part of this process, and part of history in the making. I can't wait to see these recommendations become a plan, and that plan becoming a reality. I'm hopeful that this new program support and enable the more than 40,000 autistic children to thrive.






