PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Children at Risk, Ottawa (CAR) was founded in 1979 to address the urgent need of the thousands of children in Eastern Ontario diagnosed within the Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD). For over 30 years, we have demonstrated the knowledge and expertise to provide families and professionals with appropriate, Autism specific supports and resources. CAR brings positive change into the lives of those with ASD and their families. Timely and appropriate intervention does make a significant difference.

CAR works hard with community, education and medical and mental health professionals to break down the barriers for individuals diagnosed with ASD, and to provide support for the social/emotional and mental health issues associated with it – filling in the gaps in services that exist with publicly-funded government agencies.

Listed below are general statistics for 2008 from the Asperger's Society of Ontario for queries from individuals with ASD, their families, friends and other professionals in the community that cover an array of topics and come from a wide range of individuals who are connected to ASD in some way:

• 28% of the inquires were from parents and other caregivers seeking a diagnosis for a young child, or with a recently diagnosed child with ASD, who are looking to better understand ASD and how to support the child in their life;

- 22% required help related to schooling and education;
- 23% were related to finding support or a diagnosis for an adult;
- 27% were interested in more information on the support groups, workshops and services offered.

Children at Risk needs your help to continue our work providing:

- Parent support and professional consultations
- Social Interaction groups for children and teens with ASD
- Referrals to other agencies and community services
- School Supports (i.e., recommendations for IEPs/IPRCs and suggested interventions)
- Information and training on ASD to educators, medical and mental health professionals, employers and the broader public, workshops and seminars
- Partnerships with other like agencies
- Support of ASD specific research initiatives across Canada through exposure

We are not government funded and rely solely on donations and member fees.

REPRINT OF CISS ARTICLE

Through a series of articles, the CISS team takes a look at some of the children that they have supported through the years to discover "where are they now"?

Who:

Hello. This is my 17-year-old son, Dominick Poirier, who at age two and a half was diagnosed at CHEO (Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario) with Pervasive Developmental Disorder (PDD nos). With the support of family and friends I was able to find the best available services to help Dominick and today it is remarkable to see how much he has benefitted. I sincerely thank all the people who have assisted Dominick for their exceptional work and dedication.

The Early Years:

During our first visit to a new pediatrician, the doctor found that Dominick showed signs of autism. He was nonverbal, made no eye contact, and seemed to "inhabit his own little world". The doctor referred us to the Child



Development Services at CHEO and Children at Risk program. I had just given birth to Dominick's little brother Erik two months earlier, and was experiencing a great deal of emotion, stress and anxiety. Despite this, I found the courage, strength and determination required to ensure Dominick obtained the services he needed.

The Children at Risk services started in the fall of 1993. Dominick then entered preschool at Thursday's Child Nursery School in January of 1994. We received home services from an excellent Children at Risk counsellor throughout that year. The following year, while enrolled in preschool at *Le Carrefourd'Ottawa*, Dominick was assisted by a superb Integration Advisor from Children's Integration Support Services, through Andrew Fleck Child Care Services until June 1996. In the summer of 1995, he attended the *Centre préscolaire La Coccinelle* before enrolling in the *Centre éducatif Beausoleil*. Dominick also received speech therapy at CHEO and through the Special Services at Home (SSAH) program.

Thanks to the assistance and services our family received, Dominick made considerable progress during his preschool years. Dominick was an affectionate child, well liked by everyone, and the future was full of hope and possibility. When it came time to prepare for school in September 1996, we were ready!

The School Years:

In September 1996, Dominick entered kindergarten at École élémentaire catholique St-Gabriel with the support of teachers in the PDD class (similar to the Autism program in the English school boards). He also received occupational therapy services. He completed his second year at the school just as it was closing its doors, and so, completed grades 3 to 6 at École élémentaire catholique Arc-en-ciel, in his own neighbourhood of Orleans, from September 1999 to June 2003.

At École secondaire publique Gisèle-Lalonde, Dominick began Grade 7 in a segregated class. It was an extraordinary year for him, and his teacher and instructors were first-rate. In Grade 8, Dominick was awarded a certificate in the "Effort and Perseverance" category -- a special moment for all of us. The recognition helped boost his confidence and self-esteem, which need constant reinforcement when coping with the difficulties, ordeals and challenges of everyday life.

From Grade 8 to today, Dominick has attended regular classes, with assistance when needed, and with an Individual Education Plan in place. He attends an excellent

school with a dedicated teaching staff, where he has many good friends.

Dominick has very good grades. He wants to do well academically, and does so. At parent-teacher interviews, the feedback is always positive. His difficulties have more to do with short-term auditory memory, as well as abstract and social concepts. Dominick is an anxious and sensitive adolescent who tries hard to please his teachers and peers. He understands the challenge of maintaining friendships, since it has not always been easy for him.


Dominick started Grade 12 at the end of August, and will graduate high school in June 2009!

Recreational and Life Experience:


Dominick has a likeable personality, and is cheerful, polite and very appreciative. He likes stability, which he finds reassuring and comforting. His memory is very good, I would even say exceptional in areas of interest to him. Dominick has many interests and extra-curricular activities. From age 9 to 12, Dominick was part of the Scouting movement. He also likes to play softball, which he has done since the age of 13. He recently joined a bowling league. His favourite leisure activities are computer games, reading books such as "Manga" comics, television, music and cycling. He worked at Subway in the summer of 2007, and has been employed with Real Canadian Superstore since November 2007. He is often a perfectionist in his work, and is respectful toward his employers.

Future Dreams:

Dominick wants to succeed in life. He would like to attend college and discover what he wants to do in the future. He wishes to work in an occupation that interests him and makes him happy. He would also like to travel.



What I want most is for Dominick to be happy. I especially want him to be proud of his efforts, achievements and successes, and -- above all of himself! The last 17 years have been full of challenges for me, and especially for Dominick. Thanks to our efforts, to the many people who have offered their help and support, and to the love that Dominick has received, the results have been extraordinary! I'm proud of you, Dominick, and I love you very much!

Jazmine Starkey speaks about her experience on the autism spectrum.

Jazmine Starkey has more than the average teenage challenges as a Grade 9 student attending Sir Guy Carleton Secondary School in Nepean.

The 15-year-old spoke about her experiences with autism trying to make friends and fit in during elementary school to students at Our Lady of Peace Elementary School on May 5.

"Things have not come easy to me," Jazmine says. "I had difficulty with math, organizing my bag or making friends, but I'm getting better."

Jazmine says she learns best visually and can be overwhelmed by lots of noise and distractions.

"I played by myself because I didn't know how to ask to play or join in," she says.

With the help of an educational assistant and by discovering a love of drawing, things began to improve at school.

"I'm learning to believe in myself," Jazmine says.

Her speech was part of Autism Day at the school.

Nancy Gibson, from Autism Ontario's Ottawa chapter, talked to the students about their experiences interacting with children with autism.

"They are very good learners, but they have to learn in a different way," Gibson says.

Gibson stressed that autism is not contagious so there's no reason to avoid a friendship with an autistic child.

Jordan Edwards, has Asperger's syndrome, a milder version of autism.

Edwards only learned of his diagnosis in his 20s, about 10 years ago. Growing up, Edwards had a hard time making friends, so he encouraged students to reach out to students like him.

"The best way to be a good friend is to try to introduce yourself to someone who is not communicating," Edwards says.

Edwards explained that if he was having a busy day he wouldn't want to talk to people, but it didn't mean he was being unfriendly.

The students learned that 100,000 children in Canada have autism and autism is more common than cystic fibrosis, multiple sclerosis and childhood cancer.
